DATA SETS

Military Origins Dataset (MOD) (with Dan Slater and Jean Lachapelle)

This data set identifies the origins of all military forces in all sovereign states since 1945. It disaggregates four modes of military creation: colonial inheritance, foreign imposition, indigenous modernization, and rebellion. This data set is in progress and is not yet publicly available.

Military Advisor Deployments in the Cold War (with Jean Lachapelle)

This data set identifies the yearly and country-level deployment of military advisors from the United States and the Soviet Union in the Cold War, using declassified intelligence reports and government data. This data set is in progress and is not yet publicly available.

Autocratic Client Regimes, 1946-2010

This data set ↗ identifies all authoritarian client regimes, 1946-2010, using over 500 primary and secondary sources.

Revolutionary Autocracies, 1900-2015 (with Jean Lachapelle, Steven Levitsky, and Lucan Way)

This data set ↗ identifies all autocracies formed after violent social revolutions, 1900-2015, using over 400 secondary and primary sources. This data set also provides information on the tenure of all authoritarian regimes, 1900-45.

Russian Electoral Interventions, 1991-2018 (with Lucan Way)

This data set ↗ includes information on Russian interventions in foreign elections, 1991-2018. It relies on publicly available news articles, policy reports, Congressional testimony, intelligence agency reports, and scholarly sources.






